- Examples: in order to, so that, for the purpose of, to
- Example sentence: He left early so that he could catch the last train.

## 6. Time/Sequence

- Used to show the order in which events occur.
- Examples: first, then, next, after that, finally, before, meanwhile, eventually
- Example sentence: First, we prepared the dough. Then, we baked it.

#### 7. Conclusion/Summary

- Used to signal a conclusion or sum up ideas.
- Examples: in conclusion, to sum up, overall, finally, in summary, to conclude
- Example sentence: To sum up, the project was a success thanks to teamwork.

### 8. Condition

- Used to express conditions or possibilities.
- Examples: if, unless, provided that, as long as, in case
- Example sentence: You can join us if you finish your work.

# 9. Examples/Clarification

- Used to provide examples or clarify a point.
- Examples: for example, for instance, such as, in other words, that is
- Example sentence: There are many places to visit in the city, for instance, the art museum and the botanical garden.

Using these linking words appropriately helps create smooth transitions between ideas and improves the clarity and flow of communication.
